### State of Rhode Island Monthly Hotel Report FY 2013 5.0 Percent State Hotel Tax Allocation August 2012

Beginning in June 2012, the Rhode Island Department of Revenue will issue a report on the allocation of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, as required by Rhode Island General Laws § 42-63.1-3 and § 42-63.1-12. The report is meant to be descriptive and does not purport to project or assess the collection of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax. The report provides information on the year-over-year and fiscal year-to-date allocation of the proceeds from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

#### **SUMMARY OF THE 5.0 PERCENT STATE HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION**

#### Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for August:

The following table is a summary of the allocation of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in August 2012 were \$2.15 million, or 6.4 percent more than the \$2.03 million received in August 2011. The largest share of these revenues was distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In August 2012, the regional tourism districts received \$913,559 of the total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$48,461, or 5.6 percent, over the \$865,099 received in August 2011.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the formerly state-owned Westin Hotel. In August 2012, the State's cities and towns received \$512,034, an increase of \$26,716, or 5.5 percent, over the \$485,318 received in August 2011.

The Rhode Island Convention Center Authority (RICCA) receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Westin Hotel. In August 2012, the RICCA received \$31,794, an increase of \$6,540, or 25.9 percent, over the \$25,254 received in August 2011.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Westin Hotel, where it is 27.0 percent. In August 2012, the State received \$458,723 from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$28,327, or 6.6 percent, over the \$430,396 received in August 2011. The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent hotel tax is deposited into the miscellaneous departmental revenues category of departmental receipts.

The Providence Warwick Convention & Visitors Bureau (PWCVB) receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Westin Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on all other hotels located in the State. In August 2012, the PWCVB received \$238,006, an increase of \$18,620, or 8.5 percent, over the \$219,386 received in August 2011.

#### Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through August:

The following table is a summary of the allocation of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2013 through August totaled \$4.13 million, or 9.6 percent more than the \$3.77 million received through August of FY 2012. The largest share of these revenues was distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In FY 2013 through August, the regional tourism districts received \$1.75 million of the

revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$149,729, or 9.4 percent, over the \$1.60 million received through August of FY 2012.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the formerly state-owned Westin Hotel. In FY 2013 through August, the State's cities and towns received \$984,516, an increase of \$84,263, or 9.4 percent, over the \$900,253 received through August of FY 2012.

RICCA receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Westin Hotel. In FY 2013, RICCA received \$57,104 through August, an increase of \$7,839, or 15.9 percent, over the \$49,265 received through August of FY 2012.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Westin Hotel where it is 27.0 percent. In FY 2013 through August, the State received \$878,387, an increase of \$77,836, or 9.7 percent, over the \$800,551 received through August of FY 2012 from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The PWCVB receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Westin Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on all other hotels located in the State. In FY 2013 through August, the PWCVB received \$458,435, an increase of \$43,515, or 10.5 percent, over the \$414,920 received through August of FY 2012.

#### DETAIL OF THE 5.0 PERCENT STATE HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION

#### Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation through August:

The table, *Detail of Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation*, provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on a fiscal year-to-date basis. The State has eight regional tourism districts: (1) the Aquidneck Island Tourism District<sup>1</sup>; (2) Block Island; (3) the Convention Authority of the City of Providence; (4) East Providence<sup>2</sup>; (5) the Northern Rhode Island Tourism District<sup>3</sup>; (6) the South County Tourism District<sup>4</sup>; (7) the Statewide Tourism District<sup>5</sup>; and (8) the Warwick Department of Economic Development. The regional tourism districts are administered by either a regional council, a municipal government

entity, or, in the case of the Statewide Tourism District, the Rhode Island Economic Development Corporation.

In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in the district. The exceptions to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Westin Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located in the City of Warwick.

In August 2012, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$431,972, an increase of \$14,222, or 3.4 percent, over the \$417,750 received in August 2011. The South County Tourism District was the second largest recipient in August 2012 at \$157,317, a decrease of \$1,239, or -0.8 percent, over the \$158,556 received in August 2011. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the third largest recipient in August 2012 at \$123,595, an increase of \$17,563, or 16.6 percent, over the \$106,032 received in August 2011.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between August 2012 and August 2011 were: East Providence, 20.2 percent; Convention Authority of the City of Providence, 16.6 percent; and Block Island, 12.6 percent. The two regional tourism districts with a percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between August 2012 and August 2011 were the statewide district, -8.2 percent, and South County, -0.8 percent.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between August 2012 and August 2011 were: Convention Authority of the City of Providence, \$17,563; Aquidneck Island, \$14,222; and Block Island, \$9,040. The two regional tourism districts with a nominal decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between August 2012 and August 2011 were South County, -\$1,239, and the statewide district, -\$1,164.

The table, *Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities*, shows the portion of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In August 2012, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenue generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at \$165,715, an increase of \$7,095, or 4.5 percent, over the \$158,620 received in August 2011. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in August 2012 at \$73,178, an increase of \$8,714, or 13.5 percent, over the \$64,464 received in August 2011. Middletown received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in August 2012 at \$61,680, an increase of \$4,202, or 7.3 percent, over the \$57,477 received in August 2011.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between August 2012 and August 2011 were: Woonsocket, 69.4 percent; Pawtucket, 31.4 percent; East Providence, 20.2 percent; Cranston, 17.1 percent; and Providence, 13.5 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between August 2012 and August 2011 were: East Greenwich and Little Compton, -100.0 percent; Bristol, -82.9 percent; North Smithfield, -42.5 percent; and Coventry, -33.5 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between August 2012 and August 2011 were: Providence, \$8,714; Newport, \$7,095; New Shoreham, \$4,809; Warwick, \$4,604; and Middletown, \$4,202. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between August 2012 and August 2011 were: Bristol, -\$2,259; Coventry, -\$1,959; Little Compton, -\$1,256; West Warwick, -\$618; and South Kingstown, -\$342.

#### Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through August:

The table, *Detail of Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation*, provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on a fiscal year-to-date basis. In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in the district. The exceptions to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Westin Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located in the City of Warwick.

In FY 2013 through August, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$778,282, an increase of \$59,643, or 8.3 percent, over the \$718,639 received through August of FY 2012. The South County Tourism District was the second largest recipient in FY 2013 through August at \$343,555, an increase of \$24,256, or 7.6 percent, over the \$319,299 received through August of FY 2012. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the third largest recipient in FY 2013 through August at \$234,121, an increase of \$28,062, or 13.6 percent, over the \$206,059 received through August of FY 2012.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through August and FY 2012 through August were: Northern Rhode Island, 19.1 percent; the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, 13.6 percent; and Block Island, 10.9 percent. The only regional tourism district with a percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through August and FY 2012 through August was the statewide district at -6.7 percent.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through August and FY 2012 through

August were: Aquidneck Island, \$59,643; the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, \$28,062; and South County, \$24,256. The only regional tourism district with a nominal decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through August and FY 2012 through August was the statewide district at -\$1,901.

The table, *Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities*, shows the portion of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In FY 2013 through August, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenue generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at \$284,514, an increase of \$29,490, or 11.6 percent, over the \$255,024 received through August of FY 2012. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2013 through August at \$141,220, an increase of \$16,098, or 12.9 percent, over the \$125,122 received through August of FY 2012. Middletown received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2013 through August at \$119,149, an increase of \$2,878, or 2.5 percent, over the \$116,271 received through August of FY 2012.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through August and FY 2012 through August were: East Greenwich, 543.1 percent; Woonsocket, 60.3 percent; West Greenwich, 42.4 percent; Pawtucket, 33.1 percent; and Bristol, 26.0 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through August and FY 2012 through August were: Little Compton, -46.3 percent; Coventry, -23.6 percent; Scituate, -12.8 percent; Jamestown, -12.5 percent; and West Warwick, -9.0 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through August and FY 2012 through August were: Newport, \$29,490; Providence, \$16,098; Warwick, \$10,130; Westerly, \$8,617; and New Shoreham, \$8,156. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through August and FY 2012 through August were: Coventry, -\$2,358; Little Compton, -\$1,271; West Warwick, -\$1,136; Jamestown, -\$274; and Charlestown, -\$194.

## RHODE ISLAND 5.0% STATE HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION TO MUNICIPALITIES Fiscal Year-to-Date Analysis
