### State of Rhode Island Monthly Hotel Report FY 2013 5.0 Percent State Hotel Tax Allocation October 2012

Beginning in June 2012, the Rhode Island Department of Revenue will issue a report on the allocation of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, as required by Rhode Island General Laws § 42-63.1-3 and § 42-63.1-12. The report is meant to be descriptive and does not purport to project or assess the collection of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax. The report provides information on the year-over-year and fiscal year-to-date allocation of the proceeds from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

#### SUMMARY OF THE 5.0 PERCENT STATE HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION

#### Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for October:

The following table is a summary of the year-over-year allocation of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in October 2012 were \$1.55 million, or 6.1 percent more than the \$1.46 million received in October 2011. The largest share of these revenues was distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In October 2012, the regional tourism districts received \$624,634 of the total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$25,927, or 4.3 percent, from the \$598,707 received in October 2011.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the formerly state-owned Westin Hotel. In October 2012, the State's cities and towns received \$356,998, an increase of \$15,927, or 4.7 percent, from the \$341,071 received in October 2011.

The Rhode Island Convention Center Authority (RICCA) receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Westin Hotel. In October 2012, the RICCA received \$37,521, an increase of \$7,629, or 25.5 percent, from the \$29,892 received in October 2011.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Westin Hotel, where it is 27.0 percent. In October 2012, the State received \$333,647 from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$20,245, or 6.5 percent, from the \$313,402 received in October 2011. The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent hotel tax is deposited into the miscellaneous departmental revenues category of departmental receipts.

The Providence Warwick Convention & Visitors Bureau (PWCVB) receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Westin Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on all other hotels located in the State. In October 2012, the PWCVB received \$200,262, an increase of \$19,410, or 10.7 percent, from the \$180,852 received in October 2011.

#### Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through October:

The following table is a summary of the fiscal year-to-date over fiscal year-to-date through October allocation of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2013 through October totaled \$7.46 million, or 6.9 percent more than the \$6.98 million received through October of FY 2012. The largest share of these revenues was distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In FY 2013 through October, the regional tourism districts received \$3.12 million of

the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax, an increase of \$192,919, or 6.6 percent, from the \$2.93 million received through October of FY 2012.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the formerly state-owned Westin Hotel. In FY 2013 through October, the State's cities and towns received \$1.76 million, an increase of \$107,421, or 6.5 percent, from the \$1.65 million received through October of FY 2012.

RICCA receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Westin Hotel. In FY 2013, RICCA received \$122,928 through October, an increase of \$15,145, or 14.1 percent, from the \$107,783 received through October of FY 2012.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Westin Hotel where it is 27.0 percent. In FY 2013 through October, the State received \$1.59 million, an increase of \$103,864, or 7.0 percent, from the \$1.49 million received through October of FY 2012 from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax.

The PWCVB receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at the Westin Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the levying of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on all other hotels located in the State. In FY 2013 through October, the PWCVB received \$859,263, an increase of \$60,818, or 7.6 percent, from the \$798,445 received through October of FY 2012.

#### DETAIL OF THE 5.0 PERCENT STATE HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION

#### Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation through October:

The table *Detail of Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation: Year-over-Year Analysis* provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on a year over year basis. The State has eight regional tourism districts: (1) the Aquidneck Island Tourism District<sup>1</sup>; (2) Block Island; (3) the Convention Authority of the City of Providence; (4) East Providence<sup>2</sup>; (5) the Northern Rhode Island Tourism District<sup>3</sup>; (6) the South County Tourism District<sup>4</sup>; (7) the Statewide Tourism District<sup>5</sup>; and (8) the Warwick Department of Economic Development. The regional tourism districts are administered by either

a regional council, a municipal government entity, or, in the case of the Statewide Tourism District, the Rhode Island Economic Development Corporation.

In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in the district. The exceptions to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Westin Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located in the City of Warwick.

In October 2012, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$309,200, a decrease of \$6,683, or -2.1 percent, from the \$315,882 received in October 2011. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the second largest recipient in October 2012 at \$136,742, an increase of \$22,974, or 20.2 percent, from the \$113,768 received in October 2011. The Warwick Department of Economic Development was the third largest recipient in October 2012 at \$67,287, an increase of \$7,964, or 13.4 percent, from the \$59,323 received in October 2011

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between October 2012 and October 2011 were: the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, 20.2 percent; the Warwick Department of Economic Development, 13.4 percent; and Northern Rhode Island, 8.8 percent. The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between October 2012 and October 2011 were: East Providence, -27.8 percent; the statewide district, -20.7 percent; and Block Island, -2.4 percent.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between October 2012 and October 2011 were: the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, \$22,974; the Warwick Department of Economic Development, \$7,964; and Northern Rhode Island, \$2,692. The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between October 2012 and October 2011 were: Aquidneck Island, -\$6,683; the statewide district, -\$2,424; and East Providence, -\$952.

The table *Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Year-over-Year Analysis* shows the portion of revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In October 2012, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenue generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at \$134,313, a decrease of \$3,071, or -2.2 percent, from the \$137,385 received in October 2011. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in October 2012 at \$79,008, an increase of \$12,170, or 18.2 percent, from the \$66,838 received in October 2011. Warwick received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in October 2012 at \$54,264, an increase of \$6,422, or 13.4 percent, from the \$47,841 received in October 2011.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between October 2012 and October 2011 were: Jamestown, 108.6 percent; Portsmouth, 42.9 percent; Woonsocket, 35.0 percent; South Kingstown, 23.1 percent; and North Kingstown, 21.9 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between October 2012 and October 2011 were: East Greenwich, -100.0 percent; Johnston, -85.7 percent; Little Compton, -50.8 percent; Coventry, -31.1 percent; and East Providence, -27.8 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between October 2012 and October 2011 were: Providence, \$12,170; Warwick, \$6,422; South Kingstown, \$1,098; Westerly, \$937; and Woonsocket, \$888. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between October 2012 and October 2011 were: Newport, -\$3,071; Coventry, -\$1,446; West Warwick, -\$1,016; East Providence, -\$507; and Middletown, -\$476.

#### Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through October:

The table *Detail of Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation: Fiscal Year-to-Date Analysis* provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax on a fiscal year-to-date basis. In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at hotels located in the district. The exceptions to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Westin Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located in the City of Warwick.

In FY 2013 through October, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$1.49 million, an increase of \$76,779, or 5.4 percent, from the \$1.42 million received through October of FY 2012. The South County Tourism District was the second largest recipient in FY 2013 through October at \$494,309, an increase of \$27,671, or 5.9 percent, from the \$466,638 received through October of FY 2012. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the third largest recipient in FY 2013 through October at \$480,728, an increase of \$46,516, or 10.7 percent, from the \$434,212 received through October of FY 2012.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through October and FY 2012 through October were: Northern Rhode Island, 11.8 percent; the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, 10.7 percent; and Block Island, 10.5 percent. The two regional tourism districts with a percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through October and FY 2012 through October were: the statewide district, -14.1 percent and East Providence, -4.3 percent.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through October and FY 2012 through October were: Aquidneck Island, \$76,779; the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, \$46,516; and South County, \$27,671. The two regional tourism districts with a nominal decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through October and FY 2012 through October were: the statewide district, -\$7,546 and East Providence, -\$616.

The table *Rhode Island 5.0% State Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Fiscal Year-to-Date Analysis* shows the portion of the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In FY 2013 through October, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenue generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax at \$584,313, an increase of \$40,584, or 7.5 percent, from the \$543,729 received through October of FY 2012. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2013 through October at \$285,244, an increase of \$24,892, or 9.6 percent, from the \$260,352 received through October of FY 2012. Warwick received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the 5.0 percent state hotel tax in FY 2013 through October at \$209,921, an increase of \$13,674, or 7.0 percent, from the \$196,247 received through October of FY 2012.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through October and FY 2012 through October were: North Smithfield, 97.3 percent; East Greenwich, 83.0 percent; Woonsocket, 51.0 percent; West Greenwich, 21.1 percent; and Bristol, 18.0 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in the revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through October and FY 2012 through October were: Coventry, -31.2 percent; Little Compton, -20.8 percent; West Warwick, -16.2 percent; Scituate, -11.9 percent; and Charlestown, -8.0 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through October and FY 2012 through October were: Newport, \$40,584; Providence, \$24,892; Warwick, \$13,674; Westerly, \$11,169; and New Shoreham, \$10,075. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the 5.0 percent state hotel tax between FY 2013 through October and FY 2012 through October were: Coventry, -\$6,168; West Warwick, -\$3,860; Little Compton, -\$801; Charlestown, -\$637; and East Providence, -\$328.
