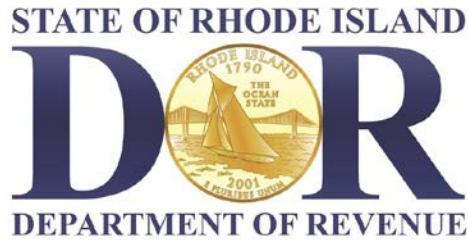

State of Rhode Island Monthly State Hotel Report
FY 2015 State 5.0 Percent Hotel Tax Allocation November 2014

Beginning in June 2012, the Rhode Island Department of Revenue will issue a report on the allocation of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax as required by Rhode Island General Laws §§ 42-63.1-3 and 42-63.1-12. The report is meant to be descriptive and does not purport to project or assess the collection of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax. The report provides information on the year-over-year and fiscal year-to-date allocation of the revenues collected for the state 5.0 percent hotel tax.

SUMMARY OF THE STATE 5.0 PERCENT HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION

Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for November:

The following table is a summary of the year-over-year allocation of revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax in November 2014 were \$1.16 million, an increase of \$113,298 or 10.9 percent over the \$1.04 million received in November 2013. The largest share of these revenues is distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In November 2014, the regional tourism districts received \$461,923 of the total revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax, an increase of \$44,276 or 10.6 percent over the \$417,646 received in November 2013.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the Omni Providence Hotel. In November 2014, the State's cities and towns received \$265,111, an increase of \$22,973 or 9.5 percent over the \$242,137 received in November 2013.

The Rhode Island Convention Center Authority (RICCA) receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel. In November 2014, the RICCA received \$28,715, an increase of \$6,421 or 28.8 percent over the \$22,293 received in November 2013.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Omni Providence Hotel where it is 27.0 percent. In November 2014, the State received \$248,536 from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax, an increase of \$25,077 or 11.2 percent over the \$223,459 received in November 2013. The State's share of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax is deposited into the miscellaneous departmental revenues component of departmental receipts.

The Providence Warwick Convention & Visitors Bureau (PWCVB) receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at all other hotels located in the State. In November 2014, the PWCVB received \$151,874, an increase of \$14,550 or 10.6 percent over the \$137,324 received in November 2013.

Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through November:

The following table is a summary of the fiscal year-to-date allocation of revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax.

The total revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax in FY 2015 through November were \$9.76 million, an increase of \$727,125 or 8.1 percent over the \$9.03 million received in FY 2014 through November. The largest share of these revenues is distributed to the State's eight regional tourism districts. In FY 2015 through November, the regional tourism districts received \$4.08 million of the total revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax, an increase of \$312,367 or 8.3 percent over the \$3.77 million received in the same period last fiscal year.

Twenty-five percent of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax are distributed to the municipalities where the individual hotels are located. The City of Providence receives the same allocation from all of the hotels located in the city, except from the Omni Providence Hotel. In FY 2015 through November, the State's cities and towns received \$2.32 million, an increase of \$181,567 or 8.5 percent over the \$2.14 million received in FY 2014 year-to-date.

The Rhode Island Convention Center Authority (RICCA) receives 30.0 percent of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel. In FY 2015 through November, the RICCA received \$144,122, an increase of \$257 or 0.2 percent over the \$143,864 received in FY 2014 year-to-date.

The State's share of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax is 21.0 percent, except from the Omni Providence Hotel where it is 27.0 percent. In FY 2015 through November, the State received \$2.08 million from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax, an increase of \$152,748 or 7.9 percent over the \$1.92 million received in FY 2014 year-to-date.

The Providence Warwick Convention & Visitors Bureau (PWCVB) receives 23.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at hotels located in Providence and Warwick, 12.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at the Omni Providence Hotel, and 7.0 percent of the revenues generated from the assessment of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at all other hotels located in the State. In FY 2015 through November, the PWCVB received \$1.13 million, an increase of \$80,186 or 7.6 percent over the \$1.05 million received in FY 2014 year-to-date.

DETAIL OF THE STATE 5.0 PERCENT HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION

Analysis of Year-over-Year Allocation for November:

The table *Detail of Rhode Island State 5.0% Hotel Tax Allocation: Year-over-Year Collections* provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax on a year-over-year basis. The State's eight regional tourism districts include: (1) Aquidneck Island Tourism District¹; (2) Block Island; (3) the Convention Authority of the City of Providence; (4) East Providence²; (5) Northern Rhode Island Tourism District³; (6) South County Tourism District⁴; (7) the Statewide Tourism District⁵; and (8) the Warwick Department of Economic Development. The regional tourism districts are administered by either a regional council, a municipal government entity, or, as in the case of the Statewide Tourism District, the Rhode Island Commerce Corporation.

In general, the regional tourism districts receive 47.0 percent of the revenues generated from the application of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at hotels located in the district. The exceptions to this allocation are the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, which receives 31.0 percent of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels situated in Providence including the Omni Providence Hotel, and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, which receives 31.0 percent of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax revenues generated from all of the hotels located in Warwick.

In November 2014, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$227,229, an increase of \$21,677 or 10.5 percent over the \$205,552 received in November 2013. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the second largest recipient in November 2014 at \$110,705, an increase of \$15,039 or 15.7 percent over the \$95,666 received in November 2013. The Warwick Department of Economic Development was the third largest recipient in November 2014 at \$47,146, an increase of \$2,347 or 5.2 percent over the \$44,798 received in November 2013.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between November 2014 and November 2013 were: East Providence, 33.9 percent; the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, 15.7 percent; and South County, 11.3 percent. The only regional tourism district with a percentage decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between November 2014 and November 2013 was Block Island at -44.1 percent.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between November 2014 and November 2013 were: Aquidneck Island, \$21,677; the Convention Authority of the City of Providence, \$15,039; and South County, \$3,900. The only regional tourism district with a nominal decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between November 2014 and November 2013 was Block Island at \$(1,209).

The table *Rhode Island State 5.0% Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Year-over-Year Collections* shows the portion of revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In November 2014, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at \$106,146, an increase of \$10,820 or 11.4 percent over the \$95,326 received in November 2013. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax in November 2014 at \$65,350, an increase of \$6,777 or 11.6 percent over the \$58,572 received in November 2013. Warwick received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax in November 2014 at \$38,021, an increase of \$1,893 or 5.2 percent over the \$36,128 received in November 2013.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between November 2014 and November 2013 were: Johnston, 1,429.6 percent; Coventry, 51.5 percent; Narragansett, 46.0 percent; Richmond, 37.9 percent; and East Providence, 33.9 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between November 2014 and November

2013 were: West Greenwich, -53.6 percent; New Shoreham, -44.1 percent; North Smithfield, -41.7 percent; Bristol, -40.1 percent; and Gloucester, -36.8 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between November 2014 and November 2013 were: Newport, \$10,820; Providence, \$6,777; Warwick, \$1,893; Westerly, \$1,262; and Middletown, \$1,116. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between November 2014 and November 2013 were: West Greenwich, \$(1,580); New Shoreham, \$(643); Bristol, \$(326); Woonsocket, \$(231); and Pawtucket, \$(143).

Analysis of Fiscal Year-to-Date through November:

The table *Detail of Rhode Island State 5.0% Hotel Tax Allocation: Fiscal Year-to-Date Collections* provides a breakdown of the distribution of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax on a fiscal year-to-date basis. In FY 2015 through November, the Aquidneck Island Tourism District received the largest portion of the tourism districts' share at \$1.97 million, an increase of \$171,637 or 9.6 percent over the \$1.79 million received in FY 2014 through November. The South County Tourism District was the second largest recipient in FY 2015 year-to-date at \$657,807, an increase of \$65,273 or 11.0 percent over the \$592,534 received in FY 2014 year-to-date. The Convention Authority of the City of Providence was the third largest recipient in FY 2015 year-to-date at \$632,628, an increase of \$28,122 or 4.7 percent over the \$604,506 received in FY 2014 year-to-date.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest percentage increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through November and FY 2014 through November were: East Providence, 12.9 percent; South County, 11.0 percent; and the statewide district, 9.9 percent. No regional tourism districts had a percentage decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through November and FY 2014 through November.

The three regional tourism districts with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through November and FY 2014 through November were: Aquidneck Island, \$171,637; South County, \$65,273; and the Warwick Department of Economic Development, \$28,805. No regional tourism districts had a nominal decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through November and FY 2014 through November.

The table *Rhode Island State 5.0% Hotel Tax Allocation to Municipalities: Fiscal Year-to-Date Collections* shows the portion of revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax distributed to the cities and towns in Rhode Island. In FY 2015 through November, Newport received the largest portion of the municipalities' share of the revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax at \$770,492, an increase of \$62,947 or 8.9 percent over the \$707,544 received in FY 2014 through November. Providence received the second largest portion of the municipalities' share of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax in FY 2015 year-to-date at \$390,083, an increase of \$22,465 or 6.1 percent over the \$367,618 received in FY 2014 year-to-date. Warwick received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the state 5.0 percent

Warwick received the third largest portion of the municipalities' share of the state 5.0 percent hotel tax in FY 2015 year-to-date at \$276,550, an increase of \$23,230 or 9.2 percent over the \$253,320 received in FY 2014 year-to-date.

The five municipalities with the largest percentage increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through November and FY 2014 through November were: Foster, 65.6 percent; Portsmouth, 46.1 percent; Scituate, 40.8 percent; Johnston, 33.2 percent; and Jamestown, 32.8 percent. The five municipalities with the largest percentage decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through November and FY 2014 through November were: Little Compton, -92.1 percent; Glocester, -23.0 percent; Cranston, -11.7 percent; West Greenwich, -11.4 percent; and Charlestown, -7.8 percent.

The five municipalities with the largest nominal increase in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through November and FY 2014 through November were: Newport, \$62,947; Westerly, \$29,148; Middletown, \$26,962; Warwick, \$23,230; and Providence, \$22,465. The five municipalities with the largest nominal decrease in revenues generated from the state 5.0 percent hotel tax between FY 2015 through November and FY 2014 through November were: West Greenwich, \$(2,783); Little Compton, \$(2,025); Charlestown, \$(625); Cranston, \$(313); and Glocester, \$(146).

RHODE ISLAND STATE 5.0% HOTEL TAX ALLOCATION TO MUNICIPALITIES
Fiscal Year-to-Date Collections
